
To Coach Lane, Coach Jimmy and 2017 Parents:




My experience as a Sacramento Baron has guided me into becoming the confident and respectful young man I am today by taking the values that the program instills into everything that I do.


Growing up as a Baron, I was taught early how to play basketball at a competitive level while still having fun. This idea has carried on throughout the years as an athlete in

there for Dillon during this hard time. It was unclear whether or not he would play in the game against this team who beat us every game we've played.


